## God and Country and the World Cup?

**The World Cup of soccer is the most colorful contest in the world!** Even the tiniest nations field teams at the entry levels, and some of them make it to the final field of 32 for the most prestigious championship in sports. The 300,000 FIFA-registered soccer clubs worldwide that form the basis of the World Cup have 240 million professional players. The audience for this month's games will be more than 10 times the audience for the Super Bowl and its playoffs.

**The world loves their sports, their teams, and their country.** The televised coverage verifies that soccer fans from almost every country are even wilder than the Oakland Raiders lunatics: painted, costumed and crowned with astounding creativity. *They* make soccer the world's favorite sport, and each team is the hope and glory of a whole nation. They actually love their national teams with a zeal that approaches Nebraskans' love for the Huskers! Should sports and national fervor be this significant for us as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ?

**The Church used to restrict sports, especially on the Sabbath, as a challenge to the glory of God.** The 1981 movie *Chariots of Fire* chronicled the Scottish Presbyterian Eric Liddell's convictions about his faith, the value of sport and the limits of sport. On one hand, he believed that not to run would be to dishonour God: "I believe that God made me for a purpose. But He also made me fast, and when I run, I feel His pleasure." For this, he received praise from all England and its leaders, because he was a champion runner—but grief from his family and church. On the other hand, he refused to compete on Sunday. For this, he received grief from all England and its leaders, but affirmation from his family and church. How things have changed!

**We face harder choices than God's missionary Eric Liddell faced 80 years ago.** We live in a sports-saturated world, and for most of us the opportunity to compete overrides all other considerations. We have never lived in a Sabbath-observing culture. We participate vicariously in sports every Sunday, season-to-season with football to basketball to baseball. Eric Liddell's choices were clear, although he had to defend himself on both sides: for competing when many expected the faithful to avoid sports, and for refusing to compete on the Sabbath. We live in a time when setting aside time for God conflicts with powerful cultural values that require us to dedicate time for our sports, our kids, and our social and civic commitments, and we lack Liddell's theological clarity. But we are still required to ask, "What does God want for me?"

**The Bible values sports and country, but in submission to God.** Before his final race in the 1924 Olympics, Liddell received a Bible verse from an American coach: "He that honors me, I will honor." (1Samuel 2:30) This is the key to sports, patriotism, and all earthly things: Put God first. Cheering for my team, giving my life in service to my country, and competing for glory must all fall under my submission to God, my focus on His glory, and my joy in Him. After all, who remembers who won the 2006 World Cup? In the end, the ultimate and lasting victory and glory is never ours, but God's. And all nations will agree when it happens!

*At that time they will call Jerusalem The Throne of the LORD, and all nations will gather in Jerusalem to honor the name of the LORD. Jeremiah 3:17*

CLERK'S REPORT: We received a letter from the Rev. Hara, pastor of the Kaphuta Congregation in Malawi, thanking us for the gift to their building fund and welcoming our mission team.

MODERATOR'S REPORT: Pastor Dave will take the lead for prayer in Contemporary worship, working with Never Alone. His Jury Duty was completed without inconvenience. Plans for travel to General Assembly and the Young Life Trap Shoot should not interfere with the work week here.

Dates reserved in the Fellowship Hall by Session: Aug. 7 for Warren Campbell's 100<sup>th</sup> celebration; Habitat for Humanity on July 15 for a homeowner application fair; and Cub Pack 131 on most Monday evenings from Aug. 30-May 2, plus Sunday afternoon/evening Feb. 27 (Banquet) and Sunday afternoon March 13 (Pinewood Derby).

TREASURER'S REPORT: \$30,421 was received in May with \$38,704 in expenses. Year-to-date offerings and income are \$151,086 and expenses are \$163,655.

WORSHIP: Fern Bledsoe reported on the committee's Duties and Responsibilities, which will be reviewed at the next meeting by the Session. Also discussed: the Dynamite Duo program and its relationship to the church.

PROPERTIES REPORT: No report. Pastor Dave outlined some implications of uncontrolled access to the Nursery with no lockable doors, as at present, for future consideration.

MISSION: Doug Korth reported on the last fundraising and imminent departure of the Malawi team. We may be able to link up via Skype/internet to broadcast the worship with the Kaphuta congregation to our worship service on June 20.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Chuck Sintek lead a discussion of strategies to reach busy kids and parents. Also discussed: Promotion of sending campers to Calvin Crest.

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE: Lee Torkelson reported on plans for worship in the park at Ta Ha Zouka on Aug. 22, including a pot luck and perhaps games following.

EVANGELISM: The KPNO offer of 1-minute weekly blurbs about our church or sermon was discussed and enthusiastically supported.

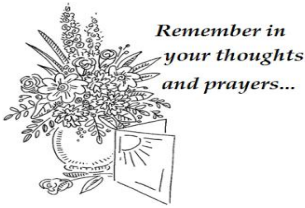

## Oh, Say Can You See? from greta Johnson, Music Director

Yes, the Star-Spangled Banner has an interesting history and it does have two verses. I hope you'll enjoy this information shared from the book, 101 Hymn Stories by Kenneth W. Osbeck.

Francis Scott Key was born in 1779, the son of a Revolutionary War officer. Francis was trained in law and served as the District Attorney for Georgetown, District of Columbia for several terms. Throughout his life, Francis was known as a fine spiritual gentleman and an active lay leader in the Protestant Episcopal Church.

During the War of 1812 with England, Francis Scott Key was authorized by President Madison to visit the British fleet located near the mouth of the Potomac to negotiate the release of a particular prisoner, Dr. Beanes. The British admiral finally granted Key's request, but because the British ships had planned an attack on Fort McHenry, Key and his party were detained all night aboard the truce boat on which they had come.

That night, September 13, 1813, was a night of unforgettable anxiety for Key and his associates as the fierce bombardment continued during the long night. As long as the shore replied to the attack, they were certain that all was still well. Toward morning, however, the firing from the shore seemed to cease, causing the American delegation great dismay. While the other members rested briefly from their weariness, Key continued to pace the deck until the first rays of dawn revealed that the "flag was still there" ---assurance that America was still free. Inspired by this experience, Key began to write his poem hastily on the back of a letter. Later that evening, he completed the work in his home. Shortly afterward he had it printed in handbill form. The poem had an immediate response from the Americans, still exhilarated by the news of their victory.

Approximately one month later, Key's poem was published in sheet music form by Joseph Carr. It was set to a tune known as "Anacron in Heaven." This tune was primarily a hunting text, having come to this country in the 1790's. Though not known for certain, the tune is generally attributed to John Stafford Smith, born in England in 1750. Smith was a composer for the Covent Garden Theater.

Despite the early enthusiastic acceptance of this patriotic hymn, it was not until March 3, 1931 that Congress officially adopted and declared it to be our national anthem. Fort McHenry guards the harbor for Baltimore, so the city of Baltimore has erected a statue in honor of Francis Scott Key.

While we sing the first verse at sporting events, many people are not aware that the song has a second verse. This second verse exemplifies the true intent of our founding fathers.

*O thus be it ever, when free men shall stand  
Between their loved homes and the war's desolation!  
Blest with vict'ry and peace, may the heav'n-rescued land  
Praise the Pow'r that hath made and preserved us a nation!  
Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just;  
And this be our motto: "In God is our trust!"  
And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave  
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!*

## CHURCH LIBRARY

Two books from the library and trophy shelves in the hall of the Christian Education Unit that may not be new to some readers are available. To check them out use the system of writing your name, the name of the book, and the date on the tablets kept for that purpose.

**My Sister's Keeper by Jodi Picoult** is an insightful story of things that do not concern most of us. The information on the back cover of the book states:

*"Can a parent love too much? Or is too much never enough?"*

"Anna is not sick, but she might as well be. By age thirteen, she has undergone countless surgeries, transfusions, and shots so that her older sister, Kate, can somehow fight the leukemia that has plagued her since childhood. The product of pre-implantation genetic diagnosis, Anna was conceived as a bone marrow match for Kate—a life and a role that she has never challenged . . . until now. Like most teenagers, Anna is beginning to question who she truly is. But unlike most teenagers, she has always been defined in terms of her sister—and so Anna makes a decision that for most would be unthinkable, a decision that will tear her family apart and have perhaps fatal consequences for the sister she loves. A provocative novel that raises some important ethical issues, **My Sister's Keeper** is the story of one family's struggle for survival at all human costs and a stunning moral parable for all time." **Voice of the Martyrs** is a new magazine available on the bookshelf in the narthex for you to read. We are so isolated from many of the things happening in our world that we need a new resource to enlighten us. I recently read the book **Tortured for Christ by Richard Wurmbbrand**. This Romanian pastor, founder of Voice of the Martyrs (VOM) in 1967, spent a total of 14 years in prison where he was horribly tortured by the Communists who ruled the country. The book was written in 1966 and is his story of his life including the imprisonment and his work after he was released and brought to the US where he spent the rest of his life—to the age of 92—calling for the salvation of all who torture Christians. We need to be aware of the continued persecution of Christians today. The magazines tell the story. I have listed some of those stories and the issue of the magazine in which it is told:

February 2010: "Why we smuggle Bibles," by VOM staff.

April 2010: "The Blessings of Persecution," by Patrice Johnson, featuring persecution in India.

May 2010: "Crossing the Line in China," by Dory P. and "Families of Martyrs: The Prayer of the Righteous in Columbia."

June 2010: "God will use you mightily," persecution in Nigeria.
